post stations of the Tokaido, or " The Road " as it was often called in Tokugawa days That was the time of the flowering of the ancient road system of Japan-the seventeenth, eighteenth, and early nine-teenth centuries The Tokaido, the greatest road of all, connected the feudal capital at Yedo (Tokyo) and imperial Kyoto (Fig 5)

Playing the game

In Tokaido, the player whose Traveler is farthest behind on the road (with respect to the destination) is the player who takes the next turn This player must move his Traveler forward - that is, toward Edo - to the open space of his choice, freely passing over one or more open spaces, if he wishes
